HEALTH & WELLNESS





Farm Well

833 community members learned how to support the wellbeing of members of the agricultural community.



Care Coordination Network & Multicultural Outreach Program

353 individuals were connected to resources throughout southwestern Wisconsin. In 2023, the Care Coordination Network integrated the Multicultural Outreach Program into the network and trained two bilingual Community Health Workers (CHWs). These CHWs worked directly with 302 individuals and connected them to resources for housing, behavioral health, medical financial aid, employment and more. Collaborative partnerships were established or strengthened with schools, area businesses, farms and additional supportive agencies.



Food Pantry

7,265 individuals received food as part of our effort to eliminate hunger. 2,804 Emergency Hygiene Kits were handed out.

Opportunity House

11 people received supportive housing while in recovery from substance use disorder.





Neighborhood Health Partners

298 individuals accessed confidential reproductive health services,
Staff reached 250 individuals through outreach and educational events.



WIC

1,172 women, infants, and children in 671 households, received nutrition counseling, help with breastfeeding, supplemental nutritious foods and connection to community services.

FAMILY DEVELOPMENT



Head Start & Early Head Start

289 children ages birth to five and 252 households received support centered around health, early learning and development and family well-being.

HOUSEHOLD STABILITY



Home Buyer

12 families were provided SWCAP Gap Financing to complete home purchase in 2023.

Additionally, 188 households received home buyer and/or mortgage counseling services and guidance.



Supportive Housing

163 individuals experiencing homelessness obtained safe temporary shelter, while 46 individuals obtained safe and affordable housing when currently or at risk of becoming unhoused.



Skills Enhancement

48 individuals received assistance to obtain training needed to qualify for higher paying jobs, increased work hours, benefits or advancement.



Thrift Stores and We Care

1,128 households received donated items at affordable prices or free diapers, baby wipes and clothing. 369 vouchers were issued for free diapers to those in need.



Work'n Wheels

111 vehicles purchased with monthly payments that are less than \$200.24 vehicle repair loans were issued and 7,938 one-way work-related rides were provided.




ENERGY SERVICES

A Nicaraguan woman whose leg was amputated following a train accident in Mexico, finally received her prosthesis through the work of Comprehensive Prosthetics and Orthotics and the Range of Motion Project. She is now working and able to support her three daughters.

Provided follow-up support to homeless couple recently housed in a Section 8 apartment in Platteville. Connected them with New Beginnings in Dodgeville, where they were able to find furniture and kitchen supplies. Helped with furniture transport.





August 2023 - Our most recent statistics show that 75% of women participating in WIC initiate breastfeeding, 49% are breastfeeding at 6 months postpartum and 29% breastfeed 12 months or more.

These numbers are at or above the state average.

Helped single mother with severe dental infection. This woman will have to have all her teeth pulled. She is undocumented and her emergency MA does not cover periodontal care. Dentistry West and Madison Oral Surgeons finally agreed to take on her case pro bono.





Mother and medically challenged adult son were unable to keep up with home repairs and a leak destroyed their front door. Their only protection from the cold was a screen door. Within two days of the assessment, a new door was installed. The roof was then repaired, and the house was insulated. They now live in a secure, healthy home.
